Inclusive and sustainable cities and neighbourhoods: the role of social innovation in housing

This academic year the MAS ETH in Housing will focus on the role of social innovation in housing to attain inclusive and sustainable cities and neighbourhood with a focus on global issues and challenges and local responses and practices.

Module 1: Global Housing Issues, Challenges Strategies: Housing (Re)construction **During and After Conflicts and Natural Disasters** will address this topic with reference to housing construction and reconstruction in context of conflicts and disasters. Globally millions of people are displaced and rendered homeless each year due to such natural or manmade events, which call for international solidarity and innovative solutions. Indeed, disasters may also be an opportunity to build back better and to address pre-existing vulnerabilities. In the framework of Module 2: Case Studies students will have the opportunity to visit and systematically analyse a selected number of socially innovative housing projects by linking the perspective of key stakeholders with relevant academic debates.

Module 3: Housing Research Methods will train students in relevant housing research methods. They will practice their acquired skills by critically analysing the innovative aspects of the visited housing project through interviews, observations, and the analysis of secondary data methods that they will further apply to their individual research projects. This year, in the framework of Module 3 we will also offer a special course on systems thinking, a theoretical and methodological approach that we will apply to jointly study discriminations in the housing market.

In the framework of Module 4: Writing and Communication Skills for Built Environment Professionals students will learn how to write a research proposal and will be guided in the process of developing their individual research project.

During the spring semester 2024 the MAS will offer a **Seminar Week** that will take place in Colombia. Students will have a chance to put their knowledge and skills into practice and for 10 days explore the role of housing cooperatives in the provision of affordable housing in a post-conflict context.

Finally, students will conduct their individual research projects resulting in their MAS Thesis.

Module 1

Global Housing Issues, Challenges and Strategies: Housing (Re)construction During and After Conflicts and Natural Disasters

057-0103-10L / 4 credits 052-0731-23L / 2 credits

The current war in Ukraine and the recent earthquake in Turkey and Syria are dramatic reminders of the plight of the millions of people rendered homeless by manmade and natural disasters. The provision of emergency or transitional shelters and the reconstruction of durable and contextually appropriate housing solutions requires the support of architects, urban planners and other built environment professionals with a thorough understanding of the specific issues and challenges entailed in working for and with affected communities. Based on concrete examples and extensive international field experience, the lecturers involved in this course will introduce students to the advantages and risk of emergency shelter and different housing reconstruction practices and their links to community empowerment. A selected number of guest speakers from different countries will present concrete shelter and housing projects initiatives from across the globe. The course aims at raising awareness among students of the complexity of shelter and housing reconstruction during and after conflicts and disasters.

In the last two decades European cities, have experienced a growing housing crisis resulting in the exclusion of large groups of people who cannot access adequate and affordable housing. Drivers for the growing gap between what people need and what the housing market offers include amongst many other factors the financialization of housing, the withdrawal of the state from the production of affordable housing, and demographic changes such as an ageing population with specific housing needs and an increasing number of migrants seeking safety and opportunities in urban areas (Garcia & Vicari Haddock, 2016). In the framework of this course, we will visit a selected number of housing projects and collectively analyse what makes them innovative from a social, economic, environmental, and institutional perspective.

Module 3

Housing Research Methods

057-0101-10L / 10 credits

Scientific research entails the ability to link the analysis of a specific topic to broader academic debates. Accordingly, in this module students will be trained in analysing empirical phenomena (e.g. specific housing projects) with reference to ongoing debates within the field of housing studies. This course furthermore offers an introduction to a wide range of research methods currently used in housing and neighbourhood studies. Students will be invited to reflect on the value of using different tools and to provide rigorous answers to research question by covering all the steps of the research cycle. By combining theory and practice, they will learn to apply these methods to research questions and finally introduce them into their individual research projects culminating in their MAS thesis.

In order to bring students in close contact with currently relevant issues in housing research and first-hand use of social and spatial research methodologies, the course will address two specific topics; the first topic -Social Innovation in Housing- is closely related to Module 2 whereby students will be guided to analyse and document the visited housing projects by applying the overall research methods in which they will be trained. The second topic - Discrimination in the Housing Market - will enable students to apply systems thinking to a concrete housing problem. Indeed discriminations in the housing market are amongst the most prevalent barriers to the fulfilment of the right to adequate housing today and results in lack of access to the key elements that make housing adequate: security of tenure, access to services and infrastructure, affordability, accessible habitability and cultural adequacy (OHCHR/UN-Habitat, 2020). Housing discrimination and sociospatial segregation are disproportionally experienced by marginalized groups including persons with disabilities, migrants, racial and ethnic minorities, and gender-based discrimination.

The results of the two projects to be developed throughout the course will be exhibited and presented at the end of the semester.

Module 4

Writing and Communication Skills for Built Environment Professionals How to Write a Research Proposal

057-0102-10L / 10 credits

A core element of the MAS ETH in Housing is the elaboration of a research-based individual thesis. In the framework of this module students will learn the fundamentals of conducting their own research project, from defining a clear research question, to formulating valid hypotheses, and developing a feasible research design. The course is intended to support the students to develop their individual proposals and to possess the necessary skill to work independently and with scientific rigour on a project leading to their final MAS thesis.
