Abstract

Interest in the history of humanitarianism has been growing in the last two decades and has resulted in an increasing number of research projects, inter-disciplinary conferences and publications. Many of these initiatives aim to add a historical perspective to ongoing debates, seeking to make history an accessible resource to assist aid practitioners and policy makers in dealing with the shortcomings and dilemmas of humanitarianism. In this course, students will learn about approaches and perspectives applied in the emerging historiography of humanitarianism and development assistance. They will discuss and evaluate the extent to which history can and should inform current debates, reflect on the strengths and identify the limits of such approaches.

Requirements

- Regular attendance (don't miss more than one session)
- Regular reading of mandatory texts (readings will be provided via moodle)
- Brief comments (150 to 250 words) on readings to be submitted two days before the next session via moodle (starting with session 2). Guiding questions will be provided.
- Completion of two assignments during the semester: In preparation of session 4 and 6, you will be given a historical source and/or additional readings together with a set of guiding questions. You will be asked to discuss and present the results in small groups during the session.
- Completion of an essay until 30.06.2018 (50%)
