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Explanatory notes:

This statistical annex provides summary statistics for the Swiss Panel Global Cooperation 2023 Survey. All statistics were calculated with sampling weights. It is the third round of this survey. Information on the findings of the 2021 and 2022 survey rounds can be found under *https://nadel.ethz.ch/swiss-panel/2021.html*.and *https://nadel.ethz.ch/swiss-panel/2021.html*. respectively.

Section A presents socioeconomic, demographic, and other basic information about survey participants, and, where possible, compares them to the general Swiss population based on statistics provided by the Federal Statistical Office (FSO). Section B provides summary statistics of the survey questions for the *total sample (4,071 observations)*, as well as separately by *gender (female: 1,919; male: 2,044)*, *age group (18 to 39: 1,168; 40 to 59: 1,392; 60+: 1,185)*, *language (German: 2,704; French: 791; Italian: 446)*, and *self-assessed political orientation (Left: 966; Centrist: 1,689; Right: 670)* of the participants. The median duration to complete the survey among all participants was 17 minutes and 14 seconds.

This data is presented with the following caveats: 326 participants provided no information on their age and 746 participants provided no information on their political orientation and thus could not be considered in the heterogeneity analysis by age group and political orientation, respectively. 108 participants identifying neither as female nor as male and 130 participants reporting English as their language were not considered in the heterogeneity analysis by gender and language, respectively, due to limited statistical power.

For a subset of questions, different information was provided in a randomized manner. This concerns Tables 7a/7b/7c, 8a/8b/8c, and 9a/9b/9c, such that each of these tables is based on a third of the sample. Further, some questions were formulated in two different ways and only shown to half of the sample. This concerns Tables 18a/18b and 19a/19b. In addition, Table 10 is based on two thirds of the sample and tables 11a/11b and 12 are based on one third of the sample. Some questions contained multiple statements to which participants could express their agreement or disagreement. For these questions, only a random selection of statements was shown to the participants. In Tables 13a/13b, 22a/22b, and 23a/23b each participant was shown four statements.
