









- In CH: how effective is the Swiss policy-mix of relevance to Permanent Grasslands?
- Through literature review and interviews with policy experts we found that:
 - The vast majority of PG policies target farmers. None target consumers directly
 - Opinions about policy efficiency are the least positive across stakeholder groups
 - Direct payments did not deliver on the quality objectives of agric. (e.g. biodiversity)
 - For a balanced delivery of ecosystem services, new DSTs are needed (tbc)
